Dear School Community,

While it is disappointing that we find ourselves once again in lockdown, I am grateful for the support and cooperation of our whole school community in keeping everyone safe. I am sure you will all agree that our transition back into Remote and Flexible Learning has been a smooth one, despite the very short notice we had. I am proud of our staff and students who have once again transitioned to online learning with a positive outlook.

I remind everyone, that our current Remote and Flexible Learning program is set up based on your feedback from last year's experiences. Apart from the Webex sessions, which need to be scheduled, we allow for that flexibility of when all other work is completed each day, to allow every family to manage their households in a way which best suits them. We are aware that many of you are juggling your own work from home, along with supporting your child with their learning, hence the flexibility to allow you to organise your day as best suits you.

PARENT & TEACHER MEETINGS

While we as a staff are in the process of proof reading and finalising student reports, we are hopeful that we will still be able to run with our plans to hold face to face Parent and Teacher Meetings. These 10-minute meetings are scheduled to take place on **Wednesday 23rd June from 1pm to 7pm**. However, we may need to modify how these are delivered, dependent on the outcome of this current COVID outbreak. If an extension of this lockdown or COVID restrictions do not permit face to face meetings onsite, we will move to another format. Regardless, they will go ahead and be held on the same day. Please stay tuned for updates, as they become available.

I do remind you all, that if we are able to remain with our original plan, the children will attend school as normal from 9am and be dismissed at the earlier time of 12 midday.

GARDENING CLUB WIN GRANT

A big CONGRATULATIONS goes out to Ms Blatti, Ms Blackman and the team of students who form our Lunchtime Gardening Club, as they are now the recipients of a \$1,100 Woolworths Junior Landcare Grant. Our Science Learning Specialist, Ms Blatti submitted the grant proposal on behalf of Ms Blackman and her student group. Education Report – May 2021

AIP Goal 1: High Learning Growth - In Term Two, many staff are completing assessments to measure student achievement in preparation for Semester 1 reports. Our reviewer Joan Sibley noted that Coburg West is doing a fantastic job in regards to maintaining an impressive level of learning growth with all of our students.

Staff worked hard at our Curriculum Day at Melbourne Zoo on April 22nd. We were taken through a process of Design Thinking and already this has been embraced in our classes.

AIP Goal 2 - Building Voice and Agency in students - The Professional Learning Communities are embedding SWPBs into our classes and looking at ways of improving students' sense of agency in their own learning by:

- Prep further work with the Zones of Regulation, a focus on the Value "We Care about Each Other."
- Grade 1/2 "I know how to get myself ready for learning" and "I know how to organise my belongings for learning" as students improved their self-awareness and management as well as metacognition.
- Grade 3/4 "How can we support self-regulation and promote student's wellbeing" Student
 agency through self-chosen learning goals, metacognition through self-regulation and
 motivation and student articulation of positive actions in conjunction with the SWPBS matrix.
- o **Grade 5/6** "How can we use choice to improve student wellbeing?" was addressed by surveying students and some of the following actions taking place Students having input into the daily timetable, Debating Club (Term 1), Taking lessons outside, having an Hour of choice (as a reward), choosing topics for research etc.

AIP Goal 3 - Building Communities - The parent helpers' rosters have been filled and it was been wonderful having our School Community Group back on site to facilitate our Mother's Day stall and the Scholastic Book Club deliveries. We have had a tremendous response to our Trivia night and School Disco events as well.

The school reviewer was impressed to see all the extra-curricular programs we run at school and the amazing experiences we provide for students. Many enrichment activities have also taken place - The Kaboom Sports Day at the end of Term One was a real highlight. Two excellent maths incursions took place earlier this term the "Planks Workshop" had Grade 1/2 students participating in hands-on collaborative investigations around 3-D shapes and the Think Squared program, built skills and confidence for the 5/6s. Joffa's Toonschool taught our students some great cartooning techniques and our older students are learning more about the aeronautic industry in a Boeing Workshop. Our student leaders had the opportunity to attend the Young Leaders' Event at the Convention Centre on Monday and our Prep - 2s had an entertaining performance by Mr Huff on developing resilience.


Reading is more important than ever to develop literacy skills. We hope your children have fun exploring the wider world and new exciting places.

This year the story book was titled "Give Me Some Space" by author Phillip Bunting. Coburg West students participated in various activities relating to the text, with a focus on space. As part of the event this year, a link was sent with a REAL astronaut reading from space! This really got the students excited.

Some of the Foundation classes buddied up with a 5/6 class and read the book together, followed by creating bookmarks and space plates using craft materials. Other grades across the school enjoyed becoming an "astronaut" using an app featured on the website. It was all in all a successful hour, where the students were engaged in their learning.

Last week our Year 5 and 6 students participated in a Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) outreach program presented by volunteers who work for **Boeing Aerostructures Australia**. BAA are based in Fisherman's Bend, and are Australia's only designer and manufacturer of advanced composite components for commercial aircraft.

The program promotes STEM to primary school students as well as bridging the gender diversity gap that exists in STEM. As a business they are working with the community to inspire and educate students whilst shaping the future workforce.

The program aimed to;

- Inspire students by introducing what STEM is, why it is important and where it is
 in the world around us
- Explain how the company contributes to STEM
- Educate students on the concepts of a STEM based activity
- Enable students to design, build and test something
- Fun and exciting experience associated with STEM

The students enjoyed the design thinking process. They worked in groups to problem solve the challenges presented to them. Some groups designed and produced paper rockets, and then tested them. Students looked at the science behind why some rockets were able to be launched at a greater speed and a greater distance compared to others. Other classes designed and tested paper gliders and stick bridges. What a fun learning day it was!

YarraMe

Parent Help Desk

In response to COVID-19, Yarra Me has established a Help Desk for parents and carers to assist in supporting children with complex needs who are learning from home.



YarraMe's Parent Help Desk can assist with:

- understanding your child's behaviours
- providing personalised one to one telephone consultation with a special education teacher (see registration link below)
- discussion of a pathway for the family to seek formal diagnosis of learning disabilities
- discussion about behavioural support strategies
- advice on setting up learning environments
- providing targeted resources
- referral to external services

The purpose of this service is to provide parents and carers with the opportunity to discuss your child's behaviours, which may be impeding their ability to learn at home.

Sometimes the Help Desk can help parents and carers to successfully navigate potential intervention pathways for their child.


