Dear School Community,

Welcome to Term 4. This first week has certainly tested us, with adjusting to daylight savings, extremes in weather conditions, an emergency evacuation and a visit from a Federal MP, it's been pleasing to see our students settling straight back into their learning with ease.

2023 PLANNING

This is the term where we work through the detailed planning for the 2023 school year. As a staff we have begun working on; assessments in preparation for student report writing, formulating future class placements, teaching program evaluations and 2023 program budget requests. Along with this, we will be doing a lot of work to unpack the recently implemented Victorian Government Schools Agreement. This determines the working conditions of all teachers and education support staff moving forward.

FEDERAL MP VISITS CWPS

Today we welcomed our Federal Member of Parliament, Peter Khalil to our whole school assembly. He was here to acknowledge Grade 3 student Alexander P, for the powerful letter he wrote in class and sent to Peter. Alex's letter raised his concerns around gender pay equity. After receiving Alex's letter, Peter wrote back and also offered to visit our school to meet with Alex. As such, Peter attended our assembly to acknowledge the power of Alex's voice in writing such a letter and encouraged all our students to do the same. During his visit our School Captains Isla and Gigi presented Peter with letters written by our students and he was then kind enough to gift our school with National We are Learners / We are Respectful / We are Safe / We Care

flags which have actually flown in Federal Parliament. On behalf of our school community, I wish to express how proud we are of Alex and how grateful we are to Mr Khalil for making the time to acknowledge our students.

PARENT OPINION SURVEY

I would like to thank those families who took the time to complete the Parent Opinion Survey by the end of last term. This year we received a 32% response rate, or 101 responses from 316 invitations, that is a nice increase on previous years. From what I have been able to review thus far, responses look favourable overall. I will be sharing this data in more detail with staff and School Council to examine what we are doing well and what areas we need to improve in.

SMILE SQUAD FREE DENTAL CHECKS

Free dental checks will be taking place here at school this term. Commencing in the coming weeks, these are being offered as part of a State Government initiative and will be delivered by SMILE SQUAD. If you wish to have your child participate and take advantage of these free checks, please complete the forms and return them directly to the school office by 9am next Tuesday 11 October.

ENROLMENTS FOR 2023

Last term I issued letters of offer to the families who have enrolled with us for next year and have since had a flood of emails to confirm their acceptance. This allows families to accept and confirm their place with us, which in turn enables us to begin finalising staffing requirements, grade structures and class sizes for next year. As such, it is important that those who have not yet enrolled, do so as quickly as possible. Please call the office on 9386 1286 to arrange a personalised enrolment tour as soon as possible.

On the other hand, if you are an existing family at CWPS and do not expect your children to be attending our school in 2023, as you may be moving house or school, please advise the office in writing as soon as possible if you have not already done so.

PARENT PAYMENTS

As we enter this final term for this school year, I wish to take this opportunity to remind those families who have not yet done so, it is not too late to make your voluntary contributions for this 2022 school year. These payments can be made via the COMPASS App and will cover costs incurred by our school to provide the essential learning items your children utilise to complete their daily learning tasks (eg pencil, paper and other stationary items), as well as keeping our school nurse engaged to provide the daily care and support for the numerous children visiting First Aid each day.

ONGOING MAINTENANCE ISSUES & EMERGENCY

Over my years as Principal of CWPS, much of my time dealing with maintenance issues has been focussed around roof leaks. Today (Friday) alone, I placed 3 calls to the DET's emergency Make Safe line to report numerous leaks in classrooms and passage ways as they arose at various times through the day. Unfortunately, around 1pm we had to evacuate the entire school population as Fire Alarms were sounding. The local fire services attended to investigate and while we were relieved that it proved to be a false alarm, it is a concern that the alarms seem to have been triggered by water leaks. While I will be working with DET to try to resolve these ongoing issues, I am extremely proud of how well our staff and students put into action the evacuation procedures we routinely drill each year.

SUPPORTING OUR SCHOOL COMMUNITY

It was pleasing to hear about the wonderful news that our School Community Football Team were able to keep the *Golden Boot* after the Footy Showdown against Pascoe Vale South at Jackson Reserve on 11th September. These fundraising events not only benefit our school financially but also

help us build a stronger school community. As such, I encourage everyone that can, to look into how you can support the School Community Group by volunteering some of your time to assist with upcoming events such as the Twilight Market. Look out for the messages and updates from the CWPSC Group further on in this newsletter.

ORTHOGRAPHY (Spelling) Parent Information Session






Our much-anticipated Orthography (Spelling) parent information session with Julie Shepherd took place this week. As I have previously communicated, Julie has been working at our school since 2020 to support the teachers to develop a deeper understanding of how to teach orthography in context and how as a school we can develop a whole school consistent approach. Although we have had two interrupted years of

implementation due to Covid, the school is progressing. We have increased our knowledge and created whole school systems and approaches to teaching orthography and this journey continues.

Thank you to the wide selection of parents, carers and grandparents who attended this information session. Julie informed everyone about the theory behind the teaching practices, explained some terminology and modelled some of the processes that teachers use in the classroom to teach spelling.

The main ideas that came from the session included the idea that Julie is not working with us to 'sell a product'. She is supporting our school to learn how to teach orthography with context, to tell the students 'the truth' about how the English system and words work. She shared research that had been completed that supports this strategy of teaching. Julie also shared and emphasised that with orthography there are three main components, Morphology (the study of the English system), Etymology (the history of words) and Orthographic Phonology (grapheme-phoneme correspondence in meaningful context) and how they work together so that learners see the 'whole system of how words work'.



A throughline that was also highlighted was that words must be taught in context. The words teachers use as teaching points or examples connect to other curriculum areas such as inquiry, words read in books during the reading hour, personal experiences and so on. Orthography is not taught in isolation, practices are modelled in Reading, Writing, in specialist classes and the teachers guide the students in how they can use their knowledge to read and write those words. Following this, is an article written by Julie Shepherd and David Hornsby. David is currently working as a literacy consultant in teacher education and has had many years of varied experience in education. Please take the time to read this article written by these experts as it explains the theory behind the teaching practices that CWPS use.







Further to this, I will forward some information about how you can support the teaching of orthography with your child/ren at home and some additional resources that you can access in the coming weeks.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Mark Colagrande who initially recommended Julie Shepherd work with CWPS. It is only with the support of our Principal and Assistant Principal, Dan Copping that we are able to go on this learning journey. They have supported, encouraged and helped provide the resources to guide this learning journey. Additionally, thank you to our teaching staff who have wholeheartedly and enthusiastically embraced this path we are taking. As Julie mentioned during the presentation, we have not chosen an easy path, but it is the right one for our school and our students. Finally, thank you to Amy Lebon, Shay Preston, Rhiannon Mardesic and Henry Jenkins who represented their teams and attended this information session. They shared some of the work and successes that we have been having with the students, some of which is evidenced with the surrounding photos.

As I always say at the end of my updates, please ask your children what they are learning. You will be surprised by how much they have learnt and how deeply they are understanding how words work. Keep an eye out for my next update.

PRACTICAL LITERACY

Truths about English orthography: implications for phonics and spelling

Julie Shepherd and David Hornsby

In our session at ALEA National Conference in 20201, we highlighted three truths about the nature of English orthography. These truths should guide the teaching of literacy and the evaluation of phonics and spelling programs.

We can't know how graphemes relate to phonemes unless they are inside a morpheme

Meaning is required for a phoneme to express itself, Just a few examples demonstrate the truth of this: grapheme <u> represents phoneme /u/ in putt and fluff; phoneme /oo/ in put and bull; phoneme /oo/ in June and ruby; phoneme /w/ in iguana. Grapheme <c> represents phoneme /k/ in cat and cup; phoneme /s/ in circus and cent; phoneme /sh/ in ocean and special; phoneme /ch/ in cello and ciabatta.

In the sentence, I put the left boot on my left foot, how do we know how to pronounce <oot>? Boot and foot both end with -oot, but they are not rhyming words. How do we know that in boot we pronounce the longer /oo/ and in foot we pronounce the shorter /oo/? Clearly, it's meaning. We know what a boot is and we know what a foot is. The meanings of the words determine how we 'crack the code' and pronounce the words. In other words, English orthography is morphophonemic, not just phonemic. Indeed, graphemes and phonemes only exist inside morphemes, or units of meaning (Bowers J & Bowers, P 2017, 2018; Bowers, P 2021; Cooke, G 2017).

There are implications for the recent misguided practice of using nonsense words. Since they have no meaning, we cannot decode them. We can only recode them. That is, we can only go from the printed code to the aural code, without accessing meaning. By definition, there is no meaning in nonsense words, so we can't read them, we can only bark at the print and make a meaningless noise. How would we 'read' a nonsense word like doot? Would we pronounce it so that it rhymes with boot or with foot? Your guess is as good as ours, but no guess could be called reading.

'Phonics' must be taught in a meaningful context

Our Australian Curriculum shows us that we must place meaning at the centre of our literacy practice: educators should use meaningful contexts as the vehicle for learning and teaching literacy skills. Commercial programs are based on a limited, phonocentric understanding of how our writing system works and tend to isolate skills and emphasise rote memory.

Teachers who understand English orthography examine phonology within meaningful contexts provided by oral language exchanges, the students' writing, shared reading, language experience, literature units, inquiry units, and so on. Words are selected for investigation, or they jump out for attention, and the vital links between meaning, morphology and etymology are highlighted (See Figure 1).



Figure 1. Orthography and meaning in context

For example, a teacher planned a Language Experience cycle over a week, starting with the children going outside to play on the adventure playground. They chatted a lot, built vocabulary, took lots of photos and then came back inside and jointly composed a sentence:

We loved playing on the adventure playground.

The class then focussed on the words playing and playground and brainstormed other words with base element <play>. They announced the letters of the word play but also examined the phonemes /p l er / and graphemes . The links between the graphemes and phonemes are highlighted as they 'spell-out-loud' and tap once for each of the three graphemes:

They talked about digraphs consisting of two letters to represent one phoneme – in this case, <ay> representing long /a/.

During the shared reading of a wonderful text like Not Now, Bernard! (McKee 1980, 2020) the children are interested, entertained and engaged, making it so much easier to highlight the initial /n/ phoneme in not, now and other words with initial grapheme <n> in the text. If appropriate, you will also highlight medial and final <n>, such as the medial <n> in Bernard.

Teaching and learning grapheme-phoneme correspondences in meaningful context is as easy as 'falling off a log'! The best phonics program is your school library. Schools should spend their limited budgets on rich, authentic texts for the library, not on 'fake fonics' programs that don't understand how English orthography works.

3. The rights of learners and teachers

We passionately believe that

- learners have a right to teaching that helps them to understand how our writing system works,
- teachers have a right to professional learning that develops their understanding of English orthography and builds practical expertise,
- administrators are responsible for supporting this teacher professional knowledge and informed practice.






