We ask that you join us in thanking Lisa, our canteen manager and acknowledging her efforts over the last few years. And a big thank you to everyone who has supported the canteen over the years and volunteered their time – your smiles and visits have meant a lot!

# Children's Reference Group 2025



This year marked Coburg West Primary School's first time participating in the Merri-bek Children's Reference Group and our student representatives have made an impressive contribution across all four meetings. Alongside students from neighbouring schools, Amber (6M) and Teddy (6R) explored how local government works, learned about child safety and wellbeing and engaged in conversations with members of council about how to make Merri-bek an even better place for young people.

Throughout the year, our students provided thoughtful feedback on Merri-bek's Child Safety and Wellbeing Policy, helping shape a new child-friendly version that will be shared with young people across the community. They also identified

barriers and opportunities in local sport, recreation and public spaces, offered ideas to support children with diverse needs, and took part in community engagement activities that will inform Council decision making.

The group finished the year by beginning to develop community budget ideas for projects that could be funded through the 2026/27 Council budget. Amber and Teddy both used their voices persuasively to write submissions for grants up to \$160,000 that would demonstrate strong community benefits.

We are incredibly proud of the maturity and leadership shown by Teddy and Amber. Their efforts have ensured that the perspectives of CWPS students are heard within Merri-bek Council and we are excited to continue this partnership with new representatives again next year.

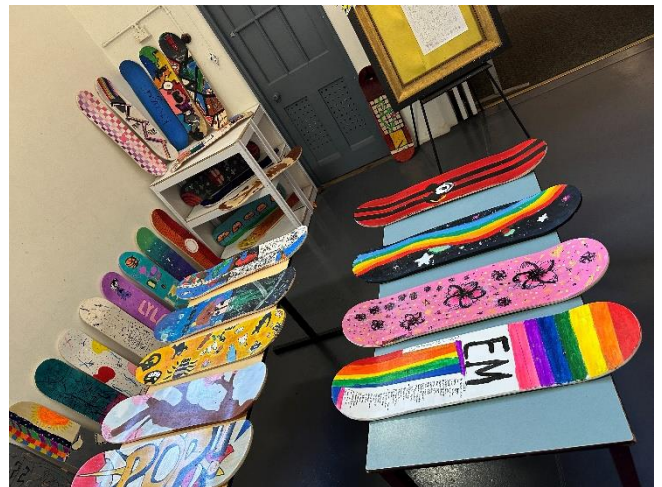


## Come See Our Grade 5 & 6 Artworks!

## GREEK ELECTIVE - REFLECTION ON THE YEAR

As we are approaching the end of the year, I want to take a moment to reflect on the amazing experiences we've shared in the Greek Language Program.

This term, our **5/6 class** explored the topic of **Migration** through engaging suitcase activities. Students examined a red suitcase containing items such as a passport, diary and travel documents, determining who it belonged to and uncovering that person's story. They explored the reasons and emotions behind migration, created their own suitcases and stories, and interviewed family members whose migration stories they will present this week.



Our **Grade 3 & 4 class** have been working on the topic of '**Gardening**'. They planted bean seedlings, monitored their growth, and learned the parts of a plant in Greek! To bring the story of Jack and the Beanstalk to life, they created their own beanstalks, props, and labels, combining language learning with creativity and storytelling.

With our **Prep, Grade 1 & 2 class**, we explored the '**Greek cuisine**'. Students learned how to make a traditional Greek salad and tzatziki and discovered the names of vegetables and key ingredients. We reinforced vocabulary through singing and movement to call out action words related to cooking, using body language to act out words like '*cut, mix, chop, put, and pour*'



It has been an incredibly rich and productive year, bringing Greek culture and language to life. At the beginning of the year, we celebrated the Greek Carnival season called '**Apokries**' decorating our own masks and embracing the festive spirit and cultural traditions of the season. We learnt about the Antipodes Festival one of the largest cultural festivals in Melbourne. We explored Easter traditions and enjoyed the cultural practice of egg smashing.

We delved into Greek storytelling through the well-known fairytales 'The Three Little Pigs' and 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears'. Students learnt new vocabulary, created props and acted out the stories.



It has been a fun filled year of discovery, creativity, and language learning. I am looking forward to exploring more exciting topics next year and welcoming new students!

## GRADE 3 OVERNIGHT CAMP

Last week, the Grade 3s in 3A went to Sovereign Hill. Big thanks to Mr. Aitken, Mr. Peric, Ms. Kingsley, Ms. Curry and Mr. Copping for making the camp happen.

We started with gold panning, swirling sand in our pans until tiny gold flakes appeared. Then we met 3P for the lolly-making demonstration, where we learned that in the 1850s they used beetles for colouring—thankfully not in the lollies we tasted!

Next was candle dipping. We dipped white candles into blue, pink and yellow wax to make new colours—green, orange, or even a funny sausage colour if you used all three. After that, 3A split from 3P and went to old-fashioned ninepin bowling with heavy wooden balls.

We met up again for the gold pouring demonstration. We watched a gold nugget get purified, melted and poured into a mold to form a gold ingot. Afterward, we went to our cabins, got ready for dinner and ate at the New York Bakery. Dinner was corn, peas, sausages, mashed potatoes and gravy, and dessert was ice cream with berries.

That night we watched *Lilo and Stitch* in the rec room before going to bed—though most of my cabin was still awake past midnight!

The next morning, we had breakfast at the New York Bakery again, then did the Red Hill mine tour. We saw a recreation of a huge gold nugget and did more gold panning before heading to an education session about old inventions like pulleys, wedges and levers.

Next the Grade Three's went into a huge mine underground and looked at how life was really like for the miners.

To finish the trip, 3A and 3P got to spend their money at the shops, then we packed up, hopped on the bus, and arrived back at school around 4 o'clock. That was our adventure at Sovereign Hill!
